**FY13 Appropriations Efforts Underway to Protect Funding for CDBG and HOME**

NCDA has been busy with its partner organizations over the past few weeks setting the stage for several important advocacy efforts to try to increase funding for CDBG and HOME in FY13. We are advocating for \$3.3 billion in formula funding for CDBG and \$1.6 billion in formula funding for HOME. We will need help from the grassroots – grantees and elected officials, in particular – ensure that we are successful in these efforts. The following activities are underway to support CDBG and HOME funding in FY13.

- **T-HUD Subcommittee Meetings.** NCDA and members of the CDBG Coalition will meet with all members of the House and Senate Transportation-HUD Appropriations Subcommittees before March 16 to advocate for \$3.3 billion in formula funding for CDBG in FY13 and \$1.6 billion in formula funding for HOME. For those of you with congressional members on these subcommittees, we need you to contact them and ask them to reach out to their T-HUD Subcommittee chairperson (Senator Murray (D-WA) in the Senate and Tom Latham (R-IA) in the House) **before March 16** and request that CDBG and HOME be listed as top priorities on the subcommittee's funding list for FY13. The deadline for subcommittee members to submit these

requests to their chairperson is March 20. The T-HUD subcommittee chairpersons will then use the member requests to guide their final FY13 program recommendations to the Appropriation chairman. ***This is one of the most important steps we can take this year to try to increase funding for CDBG and HOME and we need your help in reaching out to your members on the T-HUD Subcommittee.*** The following list provides you with the T-HUD subcommittee members along with the e-mail address for the person on staff who manages CDBG and HOME. Please send an e-mail to the contact person before March 16 and ask that your member on the subcommittee support CDBG and HOME as top priorities for FY13 subcommittee funding.

- House CDBG Dear Colleague Letter. NCDAs and NACos met last week with staff from Rep. Brady's (D-PA) office and with the House Northeast-Midwest Coalition on a FY13 House

appropriations support letter for CDBG. Rep. Brady spearheaded a similar support last year, which garnered wide support in the House for the program. Rep. Brady sent the letter (which is attached) out to his House colleagues last evening. We need your help in getting House members to sign the letter by the March 13<sup>th</sup> deadline.

- Senate CDBG Dear Colleague Letter. NCDA, NACCED, and NAHRO met with Senator Leahy's (D-VT) office on Monday regarding a CDBG Dear Colleague Letter in the Senate. Senator Leahy has been a staunch supporter of CDBG for years and has been our ally in shepherding the Dear Colleague letter through the Senate. We have drafted a letter for Senator Leahy's approval. We will forward you the letter once Senator Leahy has sent it out to his Senate colleagues. Once again, we will need your help in gaining signatures on the letter.

- 302(b) Letter. The CDBG Coalition (of which NCDA is a member) has joined forces with the Campaign for Housing and Community Development Funding (of which NCDA is also a member) and many other national interest groups to push for a higher 302(b) allocation for the Transportation-HUD Appropriations Subcommittee in both the House and the Senate. The organizations collectively drafted a joint letter to the Appropriations cardinals – in the Senate, Senator Inouye (D-HI) (Appropriations Chairman), Senator Cochran (R-MS) (Ranking Member), and in the House – Rep. Rogers (R-KY) (Appropriations Chairman) and Rep. Norm Dicks (D-WA) (Ranking Member) seeking support of a higher 302(b) allocation for the THUD Appropriations subcommittees. The letter is currently being circulated for signatures from national interest groups and will be finalized by March 7. So far, over 100 national organizations have signed the letter. If successful, a higher 302(b) allocation would mean more funding to spread around to the individual housing and transportation programs in FY13. Although the 302(b) allocations likely won't be decided until April, we wanted to submit our request early on to the appropriation cardinals. We hope to get the letter to them the week of March 12.

### **Administration Releases FY13 HUD Budget**

The President released the Administration's FY13 budget for HUD and other federal agencies on February 13. The budget provides \$44.8 billion for HUD, an increase of \$1.4 billion, or 3.2 percent, above FY12. According to HUD Secretary Sean Donovan, this program funding level is offset by \$9.4 billion in projected FHA and Ginnie Mae receipts, leaving a net budget authority of \$35.4 billion, or 7.3 percent below the FY12 enacted level of \$38.2 billion.

### *Community Development*

The Administration's budget request includes \$3.143 billion for the Community Development Fund. Of this amount, \$2.948 billion is being requested for CDBG formula grants, the same level approved for the program in FY12. The budget provides \$100 million for the Sustainable Communities Initiative aimed at fostering regional planning around housing, transportation, and economic development. The budget also includes \$35 million for the Capacity Building program (aka SHOP), which is authorized by Section 4 of the HUD Demonstration Act of 1993. Normally, this program is funded as a set-aside within HOME but has been moved to the Community Development Fund for FY13.

The Administration is requesting a higher loan guarantee authority, \$500 million, for Section 108 in FY13. HUD is once again proposing to pay for the Section 108 loan guarantee authority by imposing an up front fee of 2.46% on borrowers.

#### *HOME Program*

The budget provides \$1 billion for the HOME program in FY13, the same level approved in FY12. The budget also includes two statutory recommendations to the program: (1) allow recaptured CHDO funds to be reallocated by formula, and (2) facilitate the eviction of HOME tenants who pose an imminent threat.

#### *Housing Trust Fund*

The budget proposes \$1 billion for the Housing Trust Fund was authorized as part of the Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008 (HERA) and provides grants to States (or their designated entity) for the production, preservation, and rehabilitation of affordable housing for very low income and extremely low income households. Up to 10% of the funds can be used for homeownership, the remaining 90% will be used for rental housing activities. No less than 75% of the funding must be targeted to extremely low income households – households at or below 30% of area median income.

#### *Choice Neighborhoods*

The budget proposes \$150 million for the Choice Neighborhoods initiative which provides grants to local communities to transform public and assisted housing and surrounding neighborhoods. Of the \$150 million requested, up to \$5 million will be used to fund 14-18 planning grants.

#### *Homeless Assistance*

The budget requests \$2.2 billion for the homeless assistance grants. Of this amount, \$1.91 billion will be used for competitive renewals in the Continuum of Care (CoC) program, \$286 million for the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) Program, and approximately \$35 million for new competitive projects in the CoC.

#### *HOPWA*

The budget provides \$330 million for the Housing for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) Program. The budget also includes a proposal to update the program through a new formula that will distribute funds based on the current population of HIV-positive individuals, fair market rents, and poverty rates.

#### *Section 8 Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)*

The budget provides \$17.2 billion for HUD's Section 8 Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program to continue assisting 2.2 million families by renewing existing vouchers and issuing new incremental vouchers to homeless veterans.

#### *Section 8 Project-Based Rental Assistance*

The budget provides \$8.7 billion for HUD's Project-Based Rental Assistance program, a decrease of \$640 million from FY12. According to Secretary Donovan, "This reduction, generated by providing less than 12 months of upfront funding on some contracts that straddle fiscal years, will not reduce or delay payments to landlords or impact the number of families served by the program."

#### *Public Housing*

The budget provides \$6.6 billion to operate and modernize public housing through the Public Housing Operating Fund (\$4.5 billion) and Public Housing Capital Fund (\$2.07 billion).

#### **Senate Hearing on HUD's FY13 Budget**

Today the Senate Transportation-HUD Appropriations Subcommittee held a hearing on HUD's FY13 budget. Secretary Donovan testified on behalf of the Administration. Senator Patty Murray (D-WA), subcommittee chairperson, noted her following concerns with the housing market and HUD's FY13 budget request.

- Stability of the housing market. Over 22 percent of homeowners are underwater on their mortgages and while the recent settlement with the five largest banks will provide some relief, it will also allow banks to proceed quickly with stalled foreclosures which in turn will cause a glut of properties on the market that will further depress existing home prices.
- The majority of HUD's budget is dedicated to rental assistance programs that are tied to contracts which must be renewed. As a result, other HUD programs suffer cuts to ensure these contracts are fully renewed. In her opening comments, Senator Murray, said, "the cuts to CDBG than began in FY11 are being widely felt today. Cities and towns are cutting services to vulnerable citizens, laying off workers, and delaying critical investments in their communities." This budget faces the same challenges that we did last year to protect the rental assistance programs while reducing funding for other HUD programs. She goes on to say, "As I work together with Senator Collins and my colleagues to put together this bill, I will be mindful of the millions of Americans who rely on HUD's programs for a place to sleep each night." This statement reflects her position to protect funding for Section 8 and Public Housing, while having to be put in the difficult position of cutting other HUD programs, such as CDBG and HOME.
- The proposed budget for project-based rental assistance will manage within the requested level by intentionally not funding contracts for a full twelve months. Will we have the resources available in twelve months to meet these obligations?
- The proposed budget flat funds the Section 8 TBRA despite anticipated inflation. This will surely cause the need for Section TBRA funding to be increased in the appropriations process.

### **\$25 Billion Settlement Reached with Five Largest Mortgage Servicers**

On February 9, the federal government and 49 state attorneys general reached a landmark \$25 billion agreement with the nation's five largest mortgage servicers – Bank of America, JPMorgan Chase, Wells Fargo, Citigroup, and Ally Financial (formerly GMAC) – to address foreclosure abuses. It is the largest federal-state civil settlement ever obtained. Besides monetary compensation, the settlement will require comprehensive reforms of mortgage loan servicing.

#### *Financial Relief for Homeowners*

- \$10 billion will be set-aside to reducing principal for borrowers who are underwater on their mortgages and are either delinquent or at imminent risk of default
- At least \$3 billion will be dedicated to a refinancing program for borrowers who are current on their mortgages but owe more on their mortgages than their homes are worth
- Up to \$7 billion will go to other forms of relief including forbearance of principal for unemployed borrowers, anti-blight programs, short sales and transitional assistance, and other programs

#### *Payments to State and Federal Governments*

- A \$1.5 billion Borrower Payment Fund will be established to provide cash payments to borrowers whose homes were sold or taken in foreclosure between January 1, 2008 and December 31, 2011 and who meet other criteria. The payment is expected to be \$2,000 per borrower.
- Up to \$2.5 billion will go to state and federal governments. Funds coming to states will be used for foreclosure relief and housing programs, including housing counseling, legal assistance, foreclosure prevention hotlines, foreclosure mediation, and community blight remediation. Funds coming to the federal government will go to the FHA Capital Reserve, Veterans Housing Benefit Program, and to the Rural Housing Service.

#### *New Servicing Standards*

- New industry wide standards will be developed to prevent robo-signing, improper documentation and lost paperwork;
- There will be strict oversight of foreclosure processing, including of third-party vendors;
- Make foreclosure a last resort by requiring servicers to evaluate homeowners for other options;
- Stop banks from foreclosing while the homeowner is being considered for a loan modification;
- Set procedures and timelines for reviewing loan modification applications;
- Create a single point of contact for borrowers seeking information about their loans

### **Choice Neighborhoods NOFA Released**

Today HUD published the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the FY12 Choice Neighborhoods Planning Grants. HUD is making available approximately \$5 million for

planning grants. Grants may be up to \$300,000 each and HUD expects to award 17-20 grants. Applications are due on May 1, 2012. Awards will be made by the end of September. ### Streamlining IDIS Survey

NCDA would like to thank the Technology Subcommittee, in particular co-chair Sean Glennon (Quincy, MA) for helping compile a survey to members on streamlining IDIS. A whopping 98 members responded to the survey. The survey results will be organized and forwarded to Assistant Secretary Marquez. Here is a quick snapshot of the survey:

- How satisfied are you with the process of ADDING (setting up) projects/activities in IDIS? **61.2% satisfied**
- How satisfied are you with the process of FUNDING projects/activities in IDIS? **51.5% satisfied**
- How satisfied are you with the DRAWDOWN process in IDIS? **46.4% satisfied**
- How satisfied are you with the process of creating REPORTS in IDIS? **20.6% satisfied**
- How satisfied are you with the OVERALL EXPERIENCE of using IDIS? **45.9% satisfied**
- If you selected “Dissatisfied/Very Dissatisfied” for any of the above questions, why? And what can be done to improve this?

#### **Major themes:**

- Printing reports requires too many steps and is not user friendly
- Grantees should be able to customize reports
- Need simple help on exporting reports and saving reports
- Funding screens should calculate and indicate the amount available to draw
- If you make an error when creating a voucher you must cancel the entire voucher and begin again
- The system should allow you to copy projects from previous years to current year since projects can run multiple years
- When adding program income to an activity, the amount does not automatically sum the previous program income and the new program income
- The system requires constant “workarounds” to actually get the project set-up and funded in order to draw funds. Circumventing the system in order to get it to work properly defeats the purpose of accurately reporting accomplishments.
- Lack of IDIS training is a problem; the reference manual has not been updated to

assist with the new changes for reports

- What areas of IDIS do you find duplicative?

  - Projects/activities often request the same information
  - Setting up projects that contain multiple sources of funding
  - All accomplishment paths are duplicative
  
- What data should be dropped from IDIS?

  - Performance measures

- What data points should be collected in IDIS that aren't currently being collected now?  
**Major themes:**
  - Construction completion data or date of certificate of occupancy
  - Loans receivable from revolving loan funds
  - ESG and HOPWA activity accomplishments
  - All environmental data from RAMPS and homeless data from E-Snaps
  - HOME match information
  - MBE/WBE and Section 3 to eliminate extra reports
  
- Any other comments or suggestions?  
**Major themes:**
  - Bring back the old IDIS reports because they were more user-friendly
  - Streamline the questions/requirements for the Action Plan and CAPER
  - Allow the downloading of Action Plan information into IDIS
